Why tutoring?

When students are struggling with a tricky topic or not quite making their expected grades, they often need personalised, individualised help to plug learning gaps and get them feeling confident about their exams - but with bigger class sizes, schools often just don't have the time, and learners end up getting left behind. That's where tutoring comes in.

The EEF Teaching & Learning Toolkit recognises both 1:1 and 3:1 (small group) tutoring as a high impact strategy for giving students the boost they need.

Why us?

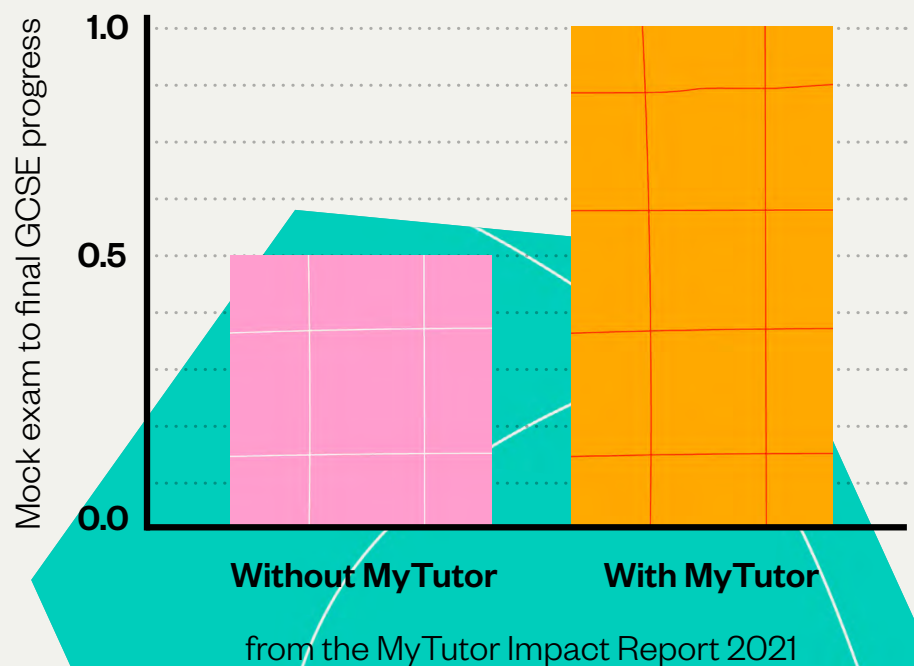

The pros of undergrad tutors



We match students with vetted and trained undergraduates and recent grads. But why do we choose them over qualified teachers?

At MyTutor, we're champions of the **near-peer relationship**. Students relate better to those closer to them in age, and they often feel inspired by them - being tutored by someone they see as a peer helps to raise confidence and aspiration, as well as grades.

Tutors close in age aren't designed to replace teachers, but to be a natural complement. Studies have shown that the near-peer relationship is highly effective and packed with benefits, including the fact that near-peers deeply understand the exams that students are going through - they did them recently, after all! Imparting that exam wisdom to students who are preparing for them has been proven to raise their confidence and lower exam anxiety.

When to choose a different type of tutor?

It’s worth noting that for SEND students with complex needs, undergrads may not be the best placed to give them the help they need. For these students, someone more specialist will likely give them the best support.



How can schools fund online tutoring?



There are multiple funding pots available to schools for tutoring, which can be used separately or in combination to subsidise your programmes. These are:

The National Tutoring Programme (NTP)

The NTP is ring-fenced government funding that schools can use with approved NTP partners (like us!). The funding provides a minimum of £67.50 per Pupil Premium pupil, which can be used to subsidise tuition up to 50% for any pupil as you see fit. This means up to £9 for an £18 lesson. And don't forget, funds can't be carried over to next year so make sure you're using it all!

Pupil Premium

Pupil Premium funds can be used for online tutoring as it's been recognised by the EEF as a high-impact intervention for disadvantaged pupils. The most common way our schools fund online tutoring is through a combination of Pupil Premium and the NTP. This year, Pupil Premium funding has increased to £2.9 billion, or £1035 per eligible pupil.

Recovery premium

The Recovery Premium is part of the government's package of funding to support pupils whose education has been impacted by the pandemic, focusing on Pupil Premium students and pupils in specialist settings. Whilst it can't be used in combination with NTP funds, it can be used in isolation or together with other forms of funding to support tutoring.

16-19 Tuition Fund

As the name suggests, the 16-19 Tuition Fund is ring-fenced for tuition and available for pupils aged 16-19 whose study has been disrupted in English, Maths and other subjects, including vocational courses. It can be used to cover small groups (3:1) and 1:1 tuition, and much like the NTP doesn't carry over to the next year.

Existing school budgets

Finally, schools can use their own budgets in combination with government funding pots to cover the costs of tutoring.

5 ways to maximise impact

How do I choose which children get online tutoring?

This is an important question, and one which each school answers differently. You may choose to give online tutoring solely to lower-attaining, disadvantaged students, or you may look to those who are on the cusp of hitting their grades and need an extra push. Who you choose may change throughout the year, as some students could benefit from early tutoring to address the 'summer slide', and others may need extra confidence before resits or mock exams.

"When we were introduced to MyTutor, we took a data-driven approach to choosing the students, identifying what we referred to as 'key tipper' students – those that we believed could make the transition from those 2s and 3s to 4s, 5s or above."

"When selecting students for the programme, we started with our most vulnerable, disadvantaged students – those in receipt of the pupil premium grant, children with special educational needs or disabilities (SEND), looked after children, or those under social care. Within that group, we then looked at those with the biggest learning gaps, and identified 3:1 groups based on common gaps in knowledge."

What are the best ways to get parent/student buy-in?

To have the best chance of success, students and their families/guardians need to be onboard. We know that for some students, if not introduced correctly, tutoring could feel like a punishment for falling behind rather than a way to help them get ahead. Some schools have introduced online tutoring under the umbrella of 'out-of-hours learning' - students aren't being bombarded with homework that doesn't really help them, but personalised support that is tailored to their needs. Having an embedded tutoring programme can demonstrate to parents that a school is being proactive in helping their child.

"To engage parents, I've also recorded my own instructional video about MyTutor, what it is and how it all works. We've moved to a video approach because when you send a letter, with our parents, we've found that they don't engage particularly well – whereas video, with a personal touch from someone they know, works really well."

“My advice to any other schools considering using MyTutor would be to lean into it. If you take steps to really embed the programme – we did an assembly on it, we called and wrote letters home to parents, the Headteacher sent texts to students to remind them of lessons – then you’ll see the true impact.”

When is the best time to run online tutoring?

Online tutoring is flexible and designed to fit around your schedule. Some primary schools prefer to run tutoring sessions before school starts. Secondary schools often find that students are most engaged when sessions are run in-school, but after school hours. The most popular hours for online tutoring are between 3-6pm, with 3pm being the most used time of day. More and more, teachers are establishing what they call a ‘mixed-economy classroom’ - online tuition happens during lessons, and their peers who aren’t being tutored will take part in other forms of online learning.

“One change we’re making is to move the sessions from after school, which was sometimes quite difficult to get students to engage with, although we did reasonably well with 70% attendance, to a timetabled in-school lesson.”

“Once we understood the different funding pathways being offered by the government, set up our ‘tutoring lab’ computer room, and appointed a middle leader member of staff to act as tutoring coordinator, it all ran smoothly.”

How do we make sure teachers and tutors are aligned?

Tutors should make teachers’ lives simpler, not harder. Teachers communicate the individual needs of each student ahead of time, so tutors know exactly where the gaps are. Schools that have seen the most impact tend to have a tutoring ‘champion’ - a member of staff who is the point of contact for all things tutoring, and helps embed it within their school culture.



“The tutors are very independent. We found that, once we provided good-quality information up-front, the tutors were able to take that and run with it.”

How do we measure success?

Thanks to tech, monitoring the progress of students is simple. We keep tabs on attendance rates, punctuality, and completed and upcoming lessons, so that you can be sure tutoring is having the impact you want. Outside of assessments, many teachers tell us that they observe a behavioural improvement in their students - they're more confident, more motivated, and have higher aspirations.
